


Focus on Collaboration 2011 Federal Agency Update

The theme of the 5th Annual Federal Agency Update, "Collaboration among Agencies," showcased agency partnerships and success stories that demonstrated the synergy created by working together. Held in Washington, DC on February 1-2, the venue offered interactive sessions presented by local, state and Federal agencies and other industry practitioners.

More than 120 attendees participated in the educational sessions, which ranged from alternate energy development and transmission line projects to the laws and regulations governing construction of roads in and around national parks. The new format, in which sessions were held back-to-back in one centralized location, provided a unique venue for peer-to-peer exchange. In addition to the sessions, IRWA unveiled plans for participating in the 2012 World Congress, and an evening networking reception gave everyone a chance to connect after a full day of educational sessions.
